3. Login using your UTOR ID and password









Primates/Prehistory

Violence

- Could be useful behaviour, a result of adaptation through evolution (ex. A defense mechanism)
- Could be part of a broad spectrum of useful human behaviours and strategies (ex. Males being more violent because they had to fight over females)
- Has to be studied in its historical context (ex. Violence in certain periods of societies, **nurture**, or natural causes, **nature**.)

Patriarchal violence between Chimpanzees

- Jane Goodall observed violence between Kasekela vs Kahama bands of Chimpanzees;
 - Males were dominant and do the killing; Male chimpanzees have struggles over power dynamics
 - Chimpanzees are very territorial and xenophobic, attacking other males meant more territory, mates, and food for them

Demonic Males

- Males that receive pleasure from perpetuation and brutality, rewarded as a product of natural selection.

Prehistoric humans ca. (*circa*, meaning approximately) 10,000 years ago

- Anthropologists of our time agree that war was widespread and regular in prehistoric, stateless (no government or authority figures) hunter-gatherer societies.
 - This is similar to the violence between Chimpanzees, with attacks being directed mainly to males
